Your child is more likely to be born with Stickler syndrome if either you or your partner has the disorder. Overall, the estimated prevalence of Stickler syndrome is about 1 in 10,000 people. Stickler syndrome affects 1 in 7,500 to 9,000 newborns. **Stickler syndrome** is caused by mutations in certain genes involved in the formation of collagen — one of the building blocks of many types of connective tissues. The type of collagen most commonly affected is that used to produce joint cartilage and the vitreous jelly found within the eyes. **Therapy: Speech therapy, Physical therapy, Hearing aids, Special education.
